## **TODAY'S READINGS**

*First Reading* EX 24:3-8 The covenant is established between God and the people.

## REFLECTION

The Gospel of Mark describes Jesus' Last Supper with his disciples as a celebration of the Jewish feast of Passover. The Jewish celebration of Passover is a memorial to and a ritual participation in the defining moment of Israel's history. It celebrates God's deliverance of his people from slavery in Egypt. The Passover meal includes many ritually important elements, such as unleavened bread, lamb, and bitter herbs. It reminds us that the Eucharist is a memorial of Christ's sacrifice on the cross. We believe that Jesus is truly present to us in the elements of bread and wine. Each time we celebrate this sacrament, we prepare for the Kingdom of God. This celebration, as the Second Vatican Council taught us, is the source and summit of the Christian life.

## CALL TO FAMILY, COMMUNITY AND PARTICIPATION TRADITION

Catholic tradition teaches that human dignity can be protected and a healthy community can be achieved only if human rights are protected and responsibilities are met. Therefore, every person has a fundamental right to life and a right to those things required for human decency. Corresponding to these rights are duties and responsibilities--to one another, to our families, and to the larger society.

#### Scripture

<u>Leviticus 25:35</u> - When someone is reduced to poverty, we have an obligation to help.

<u>Ruth 2:2-23</u> - Boaz cares for Ruth, a widow and a foreigner, giving her far more than the law requires.

<u>Tobit 4:5-11</u> - Give from what you have received and do not turn away from the poor.

<u>Proverbs 31:8-9</u> - Open your mouth to speak on behalf of those in need.

<u>Isaiah 1:16-17</u> - Seek justice, rescue the oppressed, defend the orphan, and plead for the widow.

<u>Jeremiah 22: 13-16</u> - A legitimate government upholds the rights of the poor and vulnerable.

<u>Jeremiah 29:4-7</u> - Seek the welfare of the city, for in its welfare you will find your welfare.

Luke 16:19-31 - The rich man has a responsibility to care for Lazarus.

#### Tradition

Underlying the principle of the common good is respect for the human person as such, endowed with basic and inalienable rights ordered to his or her integral development. It has also to do with the overall welfare of society and the development of a variety of intermediate groups, applying the principle of subsidiarity. Outstanding among those groups is the family, as the basic cell of society. Finally, the common good calls for social peace, the stability and security provided by a certain order which cannot be achieved without particular concern for distributive justice; whenever this is violated, violence always ensues. Society as a whole, and the state in particular, are obliged to defend and promote the common good. (Pope Francis, On Care for Our Common Home [Laudato Si'], no. 157) To be continued.

## STOP STRESSING SO MUCH

"Once upon a time a psychology professor walked around on a stage while teaching stress management principles to an auditorium filled with students. As she raised a glass of water, everyone expected they'd be asked the typical 'glass half empty or glass half full' question. Instead, with a smile on her face, the professor asked, 'How heavy is this glass of water I'm holding?'

Students shouted out answers ranging from eight ounces to a couple pounds.

She replied, 'From my perspective, the absolute weight of this glass doesn't matter. It all depends on how long I hold it. If I hold it for a minute or two, it's fairly light. If I hold it for an hour straight, its weight might make my arm ache a little. If I hold it for a day straight, my arm will likely cramp up and feel completely numb and paralyzed, forcing me to drop the glass to the floor. In each case, the weight of the glass doesn't change, but the longer I hold it, the heavier it feels to me.'

As the class shook their heads in agreement, she continued, 'your stresses and worries in life are very much like this glass of water. Think about them for a while and nothing happens. Think about them a bit longer and you begin to ache a little. Think about them all day long, and you will feel completely numb and paralyzed – incapable of doing anything else until you drop them."


