REFLECTION

Today's Gospel offers evidence of Jesus' power and authority as He calms the storm. In his day, power over nature was believed to be a sign of divinity—only God calms storms. This Gospel is a metaphor for our lives. We are in the boat, the storms of life are raging around us, and like the disciples, we may believe that Jesus is unconcerned, or "sleeping." We hope that we will be as familiar with Jesus as his disciples. If we feel that Jesus is sleeping, are we comfortable enough to wake Jesus and present him with our needs? When we bring our worries to God in prayer, we might just begin to learn to see things from God's perspective.

CALL TO FAMILY, COMMUNITY AND PARTICIPATION

TRADITION PART III

We must speak of man's rights. Man has the right to live. He has the right to bodily integrity and to the means necessary for the proper development of life, particularly food, clothing, shelter, medical care, rest, and, finally, the necessary social services. In consequence, he has the right to be looked after in the event of ill health; disability stemming from his work; widowhood; old age; enforced unemployment; or whenever through no fault of his own he is deprived of the means of livelihood. (St. John XXIII, *Peace on Earth* [Pacem in Terris], no. 11)

In human society one man's natural right gives rise to a corresponding duty in other men; the duty, that is, of recognizing and respecting that right. Every basic human right draws its authoritative force from the natural law, which confers it and attaches to it its respective duty. Hence, to claim one's rights and ignore one's duties, or only half fulfill them, is like building a house with one hand and tearing it down with the other. (St. John XXIII, *Peace on Earth* [Pacem in Terris], no. 30)

As for the State . . . It has also the duty to protect the rights of all its people, and particularly of its weaker members, the workers, women and children. It can never be right for the State to shirk its obligation of working actively for the betterment of the condition of the workingman. (St. John XXIII, *Christianity and Social Progress* (Mater et Magistra), no. 20) To be continued

THE BEAUTY MYTH (PART III)
