TODAY'S READINGS

First Reading: Deut 18:15-20: Moses tells the people that God will raise up for them a new prophet.

Responsorial Psalm: Ps 95:1-2, 6-7, 7-9 (8)

O THAT TODAY YOU WOULD LISTEN TO HIS **VOICE! HARDEN NOT YOUR HEARTS.**

Second Reading: 1Cor 7:32-35: Paul expresses his concern that those who are married are more likely to face the distractions of earthly life than celibates.

Gospel Reading: Mk 1:21-28: Jesus heals a man with an unclean spirit and his fame spreads throughout Galilee.

REFLECTION

In today's gospel (Mark 1:2b-28), we witness Jesus entering the synagogue on the Sabbath day to teach. The people were astounded at his authoritative teaching. It's crucial to understand that Jesus didn't simply initiate the teaching; rather, he was invited to do so. In the synagogue, it was customary for the head and ruler to summon both local and visiting teachers to provide insights into the scriptures. The synagogue served as a place for prayer, scripture reading, and exposition. Consequently, being called to fulfil this role indicated capability among the Jews. The ruler of the synagogue, aware of Jesus' competence and mastery over the scriptures, easily extended an invitation. In doing so, he seized the opportunity to highlight Jesus' unique authority, setting Him apart from other scribes. Beloved, we can glean valuable lessons from Jesus' example. Opportunities will arise where people will recognize our talents, skills, and expertise based on what they know about us. Let us consistently strive to prove ourselves, demonstrating our capabilities, and graciously accepting the opportunities that come our way.

Blessing the Bread and the Wine.

Once the presider has been given the bread and the wine, both are taken and placed on the altar. If a deacon is present, he will prepare the cup by pouring a drop of water into the wine (if there is no deacon, the priest will do this) while saying a prayer. His prayer requests that we who participate in this Mass may come to share in the divinity of Christ, (symbolized by the drop water).

The blessing said over the bread and cup are derived from ancient Jewish prayers still in use today (see bellowed) by those celebrating the Sabbath. Given the context of the Last Supper, it is likely that they are very close to what Jesus would have said when the scriptures tell us that "he took bread, and bless" (Mark 14:22).

Sometimes these blessings over the bread and wine are said silently by the priest. If he says them aloud, we make his prayer our own by responding, "Blessing be God forever" calling to mind the words Saint Paul, in his letter to Romans: "the Creator who blessed forever" (Romans 1:25)

On some occasions, the gifts are incensed after the blessing of the bread and wine. Incense is made up of grains of material that, when heated, melt and give off a fragrant odor. It has been used by almost every world religion as a way of designating the sacred and showing reverence to God.

The Psalmist proclaimed in Psalm 141: 2, "Let my prayer be counted as incense before thee," and incense was ordered to be used in the Holy of Holies in Leviticus 16:12. The cloud of fragrant smoke reminds us that what we are doing is a very sacred act. When the bread and wine are increased, the altar is also incensed, as well as the processional cross. A deacon or the altar server incenses the priest, and then the congregation.



PYC EFFECTIVE LIVING SERIES WEEK 3: FIVE TIPS ON PLANNING FOR THE YEAR IN 2024

- 1. Review the past year: Before you can plan for the year ahead, you need to review the year you have just had. And don't only assume everything was awful or good. CTA: A review gives you direction for the New Year.
- 2. Establish a Routine: Aristotle once said, "We are what we repeatedly do". Routines are conscious ways of doing things repetitively and in a specific order. For example, waking up at a certain time every day and sleeping at a certain time. Having a routine helps to create healthy habits and accomplish tasks.
 - CTA: Write down 3 things you would like to do every day.
- 3. Create a schedule daily, weekly and monthly: Scheduling things to do helps you to plan your week, instead of scrambling for time to get everything done. CTA: Write down all tasks & and deadlines for every week.
- 4. Avoid procrastination: If you know what you need to do and by when then it makes it easier to eliminate most distractions. By limiting the number of distractions around you, you're more likely to get done what you need to do. CTA: Take seriously all your tasks
- 5. Celebrate your accomplishments: It's very important to attach an incentive to complete a task and perhaps incorporating this in your planning might help. It could be as simple as, "Once I finish this assignment, I can watch an episode of my favourite show."

CTA: Institute a reward system for yourself
